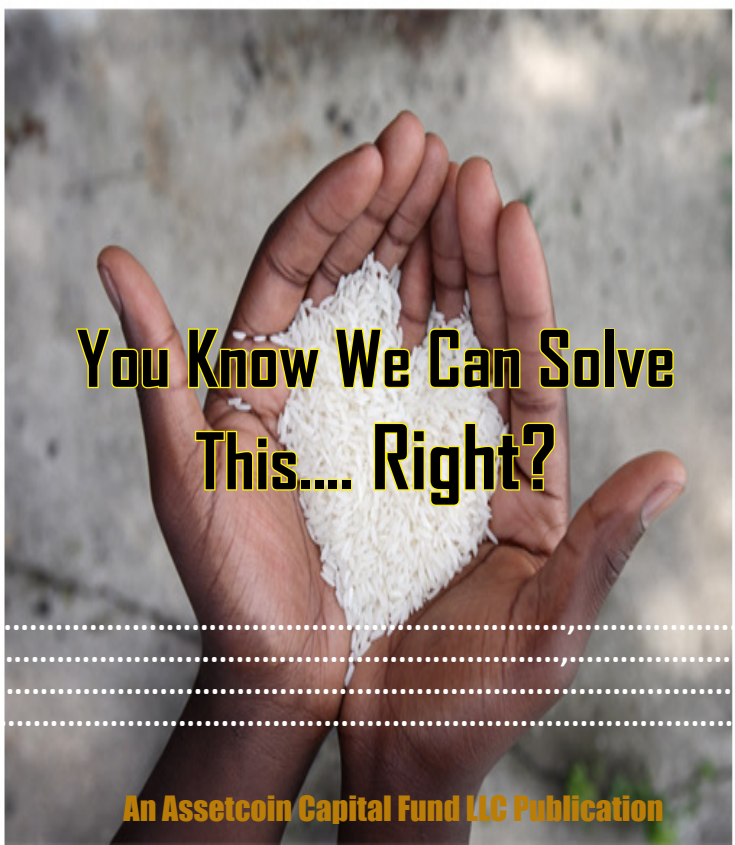


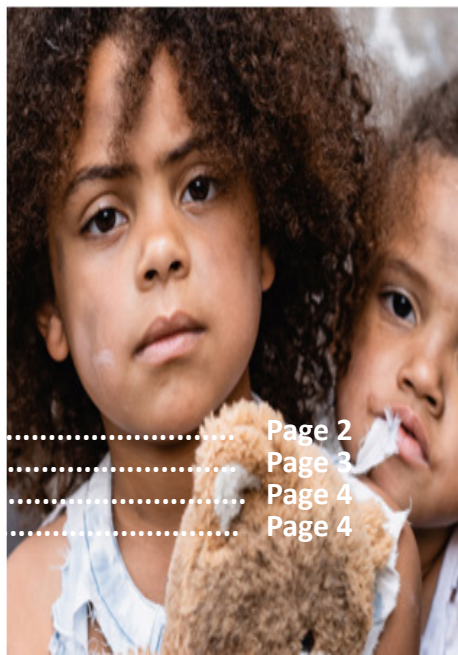

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Hunger In America



Prior to the pandemic and in the midst of a strong economy with a record streak of job growth and low unemployment rates, 9 million American adults reported that members of their households did not have enough to eat.

During the pandemic, between 10 – 12% of Americans reported that they did not have enough to eat on a weekly basis. In fact, a Census Pulse survey conducted between October 28 – November 9, 2020, nearly 26 million adults reported that their household didn't have enough to eat.

Two years after the COVID-19 pandemic that caused school closures and forced shutdowns, over 12 million children in America are struggling with hunger. Since March 2020, food insecurity rates across the nation for families with children have risen by nearly two-thirds.

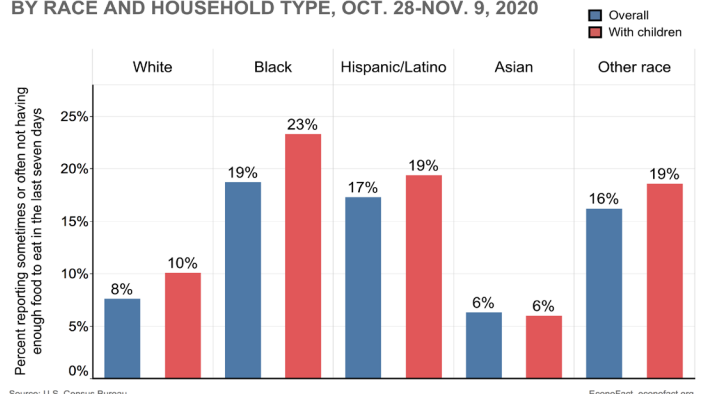
More than 1 in 5 rural children are estimated to experience food insecurity, a projected increase higher than pre-pandemic levels.

Black and Hispanic children have been disproportionately impacted — they are twice as likely as white children to face hunger in America.

The graph below from November 2020 clearly shows that across the board, families with children have been particularly hit hard; in fact, **between 7 and 11 million children** live in a household where children didn't eat enough in the past 7 days. More than 4 in 10 children live in households that report they are struggling to pay for basic needs like rent and food.

IMPACT OF COVID-19 ON FOOD SECURITY

BY RACE AND HOUSEHOLD TYPE, OCT. 28-NOV. 9, 2020



Research by the Federal Reserve Bank of New York report that during the COVID-19 recession, households with children were more likely to suffer job and income losses compared to those without children.

The loss of income has directly impacted these families to pay rent, incur more debt and experience extreme food hardship.



In 2021, an Estimated 5.1 Million Households Nationwide Experienced Very Low Food Security

Today, 12 Million (4 out of 10) Children are Hungry!

Not much has changed since the pandemic, a 2021 survey by the USDA Economic Research Service. As shown in the graph below, an estimated 5.1 million households nationwide (classified as having very low food security) reported the following specific conditions:

- 98 percent reported having worried that their food would run out before they got money to buy more.
- 97 percent reported that the food they bought just did not last, and they did not have money to get more.
- 94 percent reported that they could not afford to eat balanced meals.
- 95 percent reported that an adult had cut the size of meals or skipped meals because there was not enough money for food; 87 percent reported that this had occurred in 3 or more months.

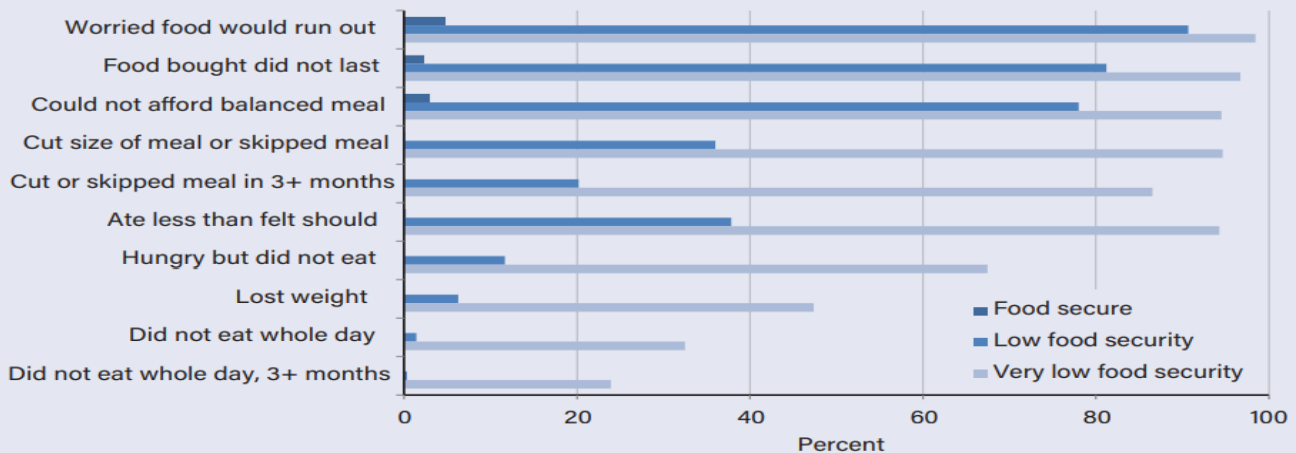
- 94 percent reported that they had eaten less than they felt they should because there was not enough money for food.
- 67 percent reported that they had been hungry but did not eat because they could not afford enough food.
- 47 percent reported having lost weight because they did not have enough money for food.
- 32 percent reported that an adult did not eat for a whole day because there was not enough money for food; 24 percent reported that this had occurred in 3 or more months

Since the pandemic, women with children have suffered the most and remain disproportionately impacted by hunger, making up 54% of those reporting not having enough to eat (and 58% of seniors who report not having enough to eat).

Children represent our future and it is our job to protect, clothe and feed them. It truly takes a village and history will not be kind to those who did nothing to help their fellow suffering American.

Our message this Thanksgiving is very simple – Help Feed a Struggling Child!

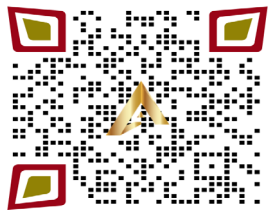
